All major courses including core and elective courses will be taught in English. The fieldwork attachment for the non-thesis option will be conducted in Chinese or English.

2.7 Contact Hours

The number of contact points assigned to a course is indicative of the number of hours of student effort, which include both contact hours and study time. In terms of contact hours, one credit point should normally be equivalent to one hour of teaching per week each for 13 weeks in a semester. In terms of study time, students are normally expected to engage in no less than 2 hours of independent learning for each contact hour.

CORE COURSES

Course Code : ECE6175

Course Title : Understanding Families in Educational and Community Settings

Credit Points : 3 Semester : 1

Department: Early Childhood Education (ECE)

Synopsis:

Educators and community service providers have frequent contact with families. Therefore, this course aims to help students develop an understanding of the literature on family studies, and to link it to practical issues that educators and community service providers face when dealing with different types of families. Using a family systems perspective as an overarching framework, the course helps students understand different family subsystems (e.g., marital, parent-child, sibling) as contexts where children and adolescents learn skills and develop competencies. The emphasis is on how these subsystems operate in reciprocal ways, and how they afford opportunities for and place constraints on the development of children and youth of different ages. Particular attention is directed to the unique situation of Hong Kong, including the pervasive influence of Chinese culture, the intense conflict between work and family, and the common involvement of grandparents and domestic workers in childrearing. Finally, the course explores practical applications of research to the real world, and discusses how various factors may affect the functioning of families from different backgrounds (e.g., low-income, immigrants, ethnic minorities) and children with different needs (e.g. ASD, ADHD).

Course Code : ECE6176

Course Title : Early Child Development and Education across Cultures

Credit Points : 3 Semester : 1

Department: Early Childhood Education (ECE)

Synopsis:

This course highlights the dynamic nature of culture in shaping child development and early childhood education. This course explores recent child development research that has been conducted across cultures focusing on comparing work done in the Confucian Heritage and other cultures. The first part of this course includes children's cognitive, social, emotional, and physical development in families, schools and society across cultures. The second part elaborates and discusses impacts of globalization and cultural values on early childhood education in families and schools.

Course Code : ECE6177

Course Title: Current Research in Parent-child Relationships

Credit Points : 3 Semester : 2

Department: Early Childhood Education (ECE)

Synopsis:

This course aims to facilitate a thorough understanding and examination of parent-child relationships. Students will examine research and theories of parenting practices and parent-child interactions. This course will also pay particular attention to processes and contexts that influence parenting behaviors, such as child characteristics, parental and cultural beliefs about parenting, marital relationship, and social conditions that influence family functioning. Major topics will include parenting theories, models and strategies; parent-child relationships as a function of age and stage of development; and the role of culture, context, and diversity in the negotiation of relational roles in parent-child interactions.

Course Code : ECE6178

Course Title : Family Education: Principles and Practices

Credit Points : 3 Semester : 2

Department: Early Childhood Education (ECE)

Synopsis:

Students will learn about science-informed practices that promote parenting, co-parenting, marital, and sibling relationships, and internationally standing family education programs. Importantly, variations in normative family practices across cultures will be discussed, particularly in relation to the cultural traditions and immediate demands of particular social contexts. Moreover, risk and resilience factors, nested within families of different characteristics and with children of different developmental stages, will be examined. Finally, theories of behavioral changes, and techniques for delivering talks, organizing courses, and conducting support groups, will be introduced.

Course Code : ECE6179

Course Title : Designing and Evaluating Programs for Children and Families

Credit Points : 3 Semester : 2

Department: Early Childhood Education (ECE)

Synopsis:

This course provides an overview to planning, implementing, and evaluating programs for children and families in educational and other settings. Different approaches to planning and evaluation will be examined. Needs assessment, the principles of program design as well as the importance of program theory will be considered. Specifically, criteria for assessing the efficacy, effectiveness and readiness for dissemination of evidence-based programs will be introduced. This course will also discuss values, assumptions, and ethical decision making in program planning and evaluation.

Course Code : ECE6180

Course Title: Research Methods in Education

Credit Points : 3 Semester : 1

Department: Early Childhood Education (ECE)

Synopsis:

This course introduces students to the practice and logic of social science inquiry in education. Within two broad paradigms of research (i.e., quantitative and qualitative), students are required to engage in the complete process of investigation (i.e., design, data collection, data analysis, and reporting) using a selected set of research methods. Students will develop knowledge about the selected methods, including an understanding of the strengths and weaknesses of each method. Students will gain competence, through directed practice, in the choices researchers have to make at each stage of the research process in order to achieve high quality results. At the end of the course, students will have gained understanding and skill in conducting research from design to reporting, such that they will be able to make use of the selected methods, with supervision, in their own masters level thesis research.

ELECTIVES

Course Code : ECE6209

Course Title : Counselling in Child and Family Education: Theories and Skills

Credit Points : 3 Semester : 1

Department: Early Childhood Education (ECE)

Synopsis:

This course aims to introduce concepts and skills in counselling for children and family, and examine children and parents from diverse types of families who might need additional support. In particular, students will learn approaches to guide children's behavior, skills to communicate with parents, and strategies to support families in nurturing their children.

Course Code : INS6040

Course Title : Field Attachment in Child and Family Education

Credit Points : 3 Semester : 2

Department: Early Childhood Education (ECE)

Synopsis:

Fieldwork attachment is to enable students to gain exposure to the child and family education and obtain practical experience. Students are required to complete a 42-hour fieldwork attachment in the second year of study, including 30 hours field attachment, 6 hours pre-attachment workshops and visit, and 6 hours field attachment seminars. Students are expected to participate in child and family services and activities, like parent days, child and family education promotion, parent and teacher association, and so forth, during the field attachment. They are required to write up a report to present their fieldwork attachment in child, parent and family education. The field attachment will help students acquire relevant practical experience and develop interpersonal skills and leadership skills in parent-child and family education.

Course Code : ECE6181 Course Title : Thesis

Credit Points : 6 Semester : 1-2

Department: Early Childhood Education (ECE)

Synopsis:

The Thesis course is a two-semester course that integrates reading, research and writing. It offers students an enriching opportunity to develop a well-defined thesis question related to a topic on child and family education, formulate and carry out an independent research project with originality, and produce a thesis paper. The thesis must demonstrate substantial knowledge, innovative thinking, analytical and problem-solving skills. Students will work independently under guidance of a thesis supervisor.

Important Notes:

- 1. Students are advised to have some preliminary ideas about their interested research area topic(s) and have initial discussion with potential supervisors before submitting application.
- 2. Full-time students should complete the online Elective Selection Form by <u>29 August 2022</u> (<u>Monday</u>). Students who are interested in completing a thesis should also submit a thesis proposal when completing the Elective Selection Form.
- 3. Part-time students should indicate their preference by the end of Semester 2 of their first year of studies.




